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JEHOVAH-JIREH

GOD MY PROVIDER

“Abraham looked up and there in a thicket he saw a ram caught by its horns. He went over and took the ram and sacrificed it as a burnt offering instead of his son. So Abraham called that place The LORD Will Provide. And to this day it is said, ‘On the mountain of the LORD it will be provided.’”

GENESIS 22:13-14

God routinely asks His people to do the “impossible”: *Love your enemies. Forgive those who have hurt you. Stop worrying. Don’t be selfish. Be joyful in trials.* These sound like the right things to do. But is it really possible to live like this?

Yes, it is—but only if we come to know God as Abraham did. Remember his story? God barged into the great patriarch’s life and graciously gave him all sorts of staggering promises and blessings, chief of which was a son (Genesis 12–21). But then, in a terrible test of faith (Genesis 22), God asked Abraham to do the unthinkable: sacrifice his beloved Isaac, the boy Abraham had waited for all his life.

It is impossible to fathom the mystery and agony of this moment. But Abraham trusted God. With equal parts terror, grief, faith, and confusion, he obeyed.

That’s when it happened. Just in the nick of time, right when it looked like all was lost, God intervened. He stopped Abraham and called his attention to a ram caught in a thicket—a substitute sacrifice.

As a result of this experience, Abraham learned that God doesn’t just call His people to action and then disappear. On

the contrary—He shows up in the nick of time, and supplies precisely what we need. The very thing God demands, He also provides. Abraham, overjoyed with wild, sweet relief, named the place of this miracle “The Lord Will Provide.” (It’s worth noting that the verb “provide” also contains the idea of seeing—in other words, God sees what we need, and then meets the need.)

What “impossible” thing is God asking you to do today? What do you need in order to live the life to which God has called you? Perhaps as you begin to make your list, you’d do well to write across the top of it: “Jehovah-Jireh: The Lord Will Provide.”

Then at the bottom, write out this great promise: “He who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all—how will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things?” (Romans 8:32).

God sees what we need and generously supplies it.

THE GOD WHO HEARS

“God heard their groaning and he remembered his covenant with Abraham, with Isaac and with Jacob.”

EXODUS 2:24

When we think about God, it’s easy to fixate on His greatness. After all, He is the *almighty creator* of the universe. He is the *sovereign sustainer* of all things. He is the *righteous judge* of the living and the dead. Such majestic attributes of power, holiness, and justice rightly fill us with reverential fear and awe. But if we see God only in these ways, we may come to feel distant from Him and insignificant to Him.

God is surely all these *great* things, but He is also a *great listener*. We need that perspective too—that God hears us when we cry out to Him, and that He cares personally and deeply for each of His children.

Like that faithful friend who puts all else aside when we show up with a need, God takes us by the hand, locks His gaze on us, and gives us His undivided attention. Psalm 17:6 assures us God is an active *listener*. But He doesn’t merely hear our words; He is also moved by the unvoiced groanings of our hearts (Romans 8:26). Is there a better picture of God’s goodness and gracious character?

Imagine you are in your car, or alone in the kitchen, mulling over a frustrating situation or an unexpected disappointment—perhaps you are headed into a hard meeting or trying to wrap your mind around some shocking news. What does the Bible say? You can actually talk to the one true God. More than that,

through faith in Christ, you can enter the very throne room of heaven. Better than that, you can trust that in those confusing, tense, or scary moments, God will be *absolutely attentive* to you (Ephesians 3:12; Hebrews 10:19).

How encouraging to know that in Christ, God is completely empathetic to our human struggles (Hebrews 4:14–16). Because He knows us intimately (Psalm 139:1), because He listens attentively to us, and because He loves us perfectly, we can rest assured that He will *always* meet our needs (Philippians 4:19).

Even when no one else seems to be paying attention, you can trust that God hears the cries of your heart.

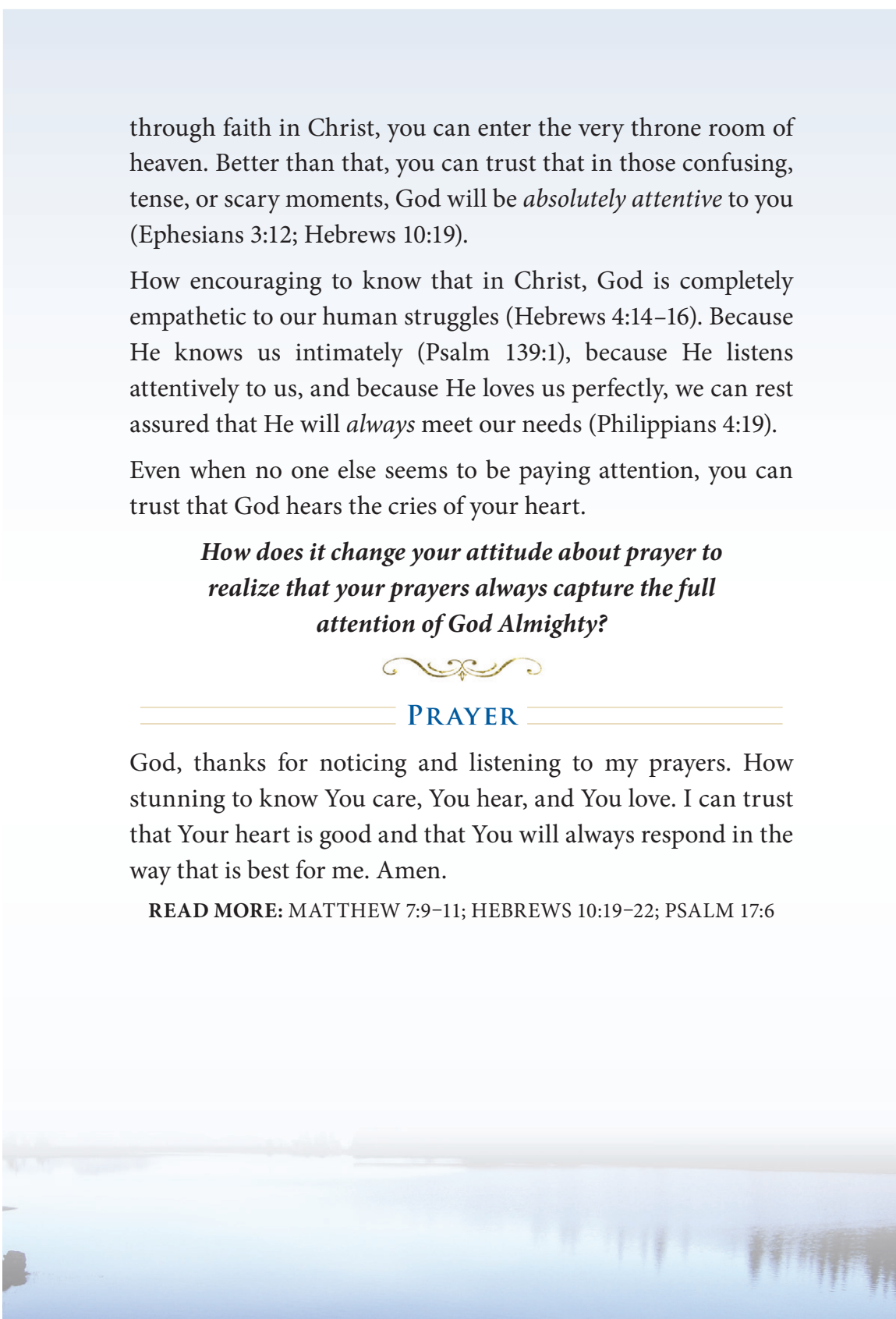
How does it change your attitude about prayer to realize that your prayers always capture the full attention of God Almighty?

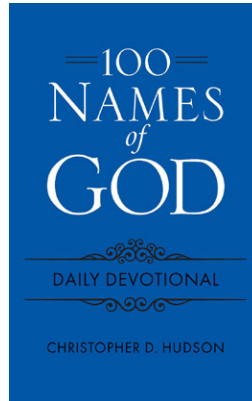


PRAYER

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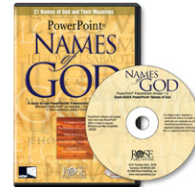
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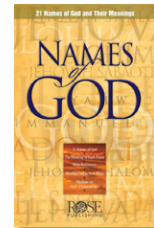
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
